

# British Columbia's Commitment

- 47M over five years
- Comprehensive and uniform approach
- Basis in traditional knowledge and science
- Emphasis on partnerships









# Why Habitat Restoration?

- Ultimate cause of caribou population decline
  - Habitat disturbance and fragmentation
- Functional and ecological habitat restoration aimed at
  - 1) reducing the use of linear features by wolves/humans
  - 2) Regeneration of disturbed ecosystems to pre-disturbed state







# British Columbia's Model

- BC HCTF Multi-year agreement
  - Caribou Habitat Restoration Fund
- Application based model
  - Restoration of high-value habitat for caribou

 Province has identified high and medium priority ranges for restoration

Website lists criteria for selecting areas for restoration within these ranges

Consult with regional caribou bio

# Quintette Range Restoration



#### **Project Overview**

- Phase 1 (2017): High level disturbance inventory for all of Quintette
- Phase 2 (2018/19): Site level plan and implementation in priority area
  - Priority area: Mt. Speiker/Bullmoose area chosen for caribou values, protections in place, availability of features
  - Study area a mix of elevations and ecotypes, indicative of midlower elevation habitat in Quintette.




#### **Quintette Habitat Restoration project**

 Treatment candidates determined based on veg characteristics and engagement

 ~39 km of linear disturbance identified as treatment candidates.

 ~220 km of disturbance is naturally revegetating on 30 year trajectory (75% of potential treatment lines)

 ~490 km of disturbance is under tenure or actively used



#### **Implementation**

- ~39 km planned for treatment
- Minor site preparation conducted summer 2018
- Remainder site prep and tree felling early June 2019
- Tree planting late June 2019
- Monitoring program ongoing



#### **Implementation**

Total of ~32.5 km treated in total. Combination of functional and ecological treatments:

- Site prep: Machine Screefing, road ripping
  - 3.04 km/ 2.24 ha
- Tree felling: cluster falling every 5 m, 200 m segments
  - 25.78 km/ 19.42 ha
- Tree planting: mixture of pine, spruce, fir, alder. Target density of 1,400 stems/ha conifer, 700 stems/ha alder
  - 10.87 km/ 7.30 ha/ ~29,000 seedlings









#### Costs

Funds provided by Forest Enhancement Society and PNCP Offset funding.

- Planning costs: \$156,000 contract with Golder
- Implementation costs:

#### Costs

- Total costs to date: \$436,000
- Costs/km (including planning): \$13,415
- Implementation costs/km: \$8,620


